Wet your hands with clean, running water (warm or cold), turn off the tap, and apply soap.

Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Be sure to lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.



Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.



Rinse hands well under clean, running water.



Dry hands using a clean towel or air dry them.

ACTIVITIES

We're hopeful that the following activities are doable with relatively few (if any) additional supplies needed that you don't already have.

Laundry Basketball

Materials:

- Laundry Basket
- Another Basket for Balls
- Several Balls of Various Sizes

Steps:

- Hang a laundry bag/basket on a drawer that is eye level or shoulder level.
- Place a basket on the ground about 2 feet from the laundry basket that is hanging.
- The child will be able to shoot some hoops by throwing or placing the ball into the hanging basket.

Fine Motor Jar

Materials:

- Straws (Cut in Half)
- Empty Parmesan Container

Steps:

- Take 4 to 8 straws and cut them in half.
- Allow your child to place the straws either through the grated side or through the larger hole.
- Shake them out and start again!

Shaker Test

Materials:

- Empty Waterbottles
- Uncooked Rice/Noodles

Steps:

- Fill a waterbottle with rice or noodles.
- Screw the cap on tight and let your kids start shaking.
- Play some music and shake along!

Tower Sorters

Materials:

- Empty Toilet Paper Rolls (if you can find one!!!)
- Construction Paper of Various Colors
- Pom Poms (or cotton balls with paint)

Prep:

- Paint the outside of each toilet paper roll. (Each toilet paper roll should be a different color.)
- After painting the toilet paper roll let it dry.
- Cut construction paper into a 2x2 inch square and glue one end of the toilet paper roll to the construction paper
- If you do not have small pom pom balls--
 - Take cotton balls and color them in paint.
 - Allow them to dry (tempera or acrylic paint will take 10-15 minutes to dry.)

Steps:

- Place the pom poms or cotton balls on the table.
- Set up the toilet paper rolls on a flat surface. The construction paper side should be placed on the table
- Allow your child to put the colored cotton balls or pom poms in the matching toilet paper tubes

Color Sorting

Materials:

- Toys of Various Colors
- One Sheet of Red, Yellow, Blue, and Green Paper
- Tape
- Laundry Basket

Steps:

• Place the four primary color sheets in a row on the floor. (If you have multiple sheets of each color you can lay down more than one to provide a larger space for sorting toys. Hula hoops work as well, but who has 4 different colored hula hoops?)

- Fill the laundry basket with the toys.
- Allow your child to place the toy onto the designated color.

Pom-Pom Bubble Stamp

Materials:

- Pom-poms
- Clothespins
- Washable Paint
- Paper Plate

• Paper

Prep:

- Clip clothespins onto pom poms.
- Squirt washable paint onto a paper plate.

Steps:

• Dip pom-poms into the paint and stamp them onto the paper.

Bunch Painting

Materials:

- Q-Tips
- Rubber Bands
- Washable Paint
- Paper

Steps:

- Put a bunch of Q-Tips together and bind them with a rubber band.
- Dip the Q-Tips into paint and stamp them onto a piece of paper.

SLIMES & DOUGHS

Play-Doh Recipe

Materials:

- Corn Starch
- Food Dye
- Shaving Cream
- Large Mixing Bowl
- Measuring Cups
- Spoon and Fork

Directions

- In a large mixing bowl combine 1 cup of shaving cream with 2 cups of cornstarch.
- If the dough feels too sticky, add more cornstarch. If the dough feels like it's crumbling, add more shaving cream.
- Separate the dough into 6 equal amounts.
- In a large mixing bowl, use a fork to mix in food dye to each ball of dough.
- Once the color is mostly mixed in, add a few pinches of cornstarch and knead the dough until the color is fully combined.

• Your dough is ready to be played with!

Three Ingredient Puffy Slime

Materials:

- 2 2/3 cups Elmer's White School Glue (you can also use clear glue)
- 2/3 cup liquid starch (use Sta-Flo starch, we tried another kind and it did NOT work)
- 2 cups shaving cream
- Large Bowl
- Spoon
- (optional) Food coloring or glitter

Directions:

- Put the ingredients in a big bowl and stir.
- Tip if you add too much liquid starch to your slime it gets a little stiff. If this happens, just add a little water like a tablespoon at a time, until the slime puffs up again.

Two Ingredient Slime

Materials:

- 6 oz Bottle of Glue, Color of your Choice
- 2 Tablespoons Liquid Starch
- Large Bowl
- Spoon

Directions:

- Add the glue to a mixing bowl. I used pre-colored glue but you can use white glue and mix with a paint color of your choice.
- Slowly add the 2 tablespoons of Liquid Starch to the bowl.
- Mix with a spoon until it becomes thicker and then continue to mix with your hands until you receive the desired consistency.Note: If the slime is too sticky, add more of the liquid starch to the mixture.

Jell-O Slime - Edible Taste Safe Recipe

Materials:

- Measuring cups
- A mixing bowl
- Wooden craft sticks or a spoon to stir your Jell-O Slime ingredients
- 3 oz. Box of sugar free Jell-O (I recommend using sugar free Jell-O only of the 4 batches that we made, it made the best Jell-O Slime. The dye doesn't stain hands quite as much when using the sugar free variety. NOTE: if using Cherry / flavors that are red in color it will leave some dye behind on your hands. It comes off after a few hand washes.
- 1 C. Cornstarch
- 1/2 C. Warm Water
- A cookie sheet or play/activity tray for playing with your prepared slime / to protect the surface that you're playing on. Directions:
 - In a mixing bowl, combine cornstarch and contents of Jell-O packet. Mix the cornstarch and Jell-O mixture together well (combining both of the dry ingredients evenly), using a spoon or a wooden craft stick. Refer to image above.
 - Slowly mix water into the mixture (stirring the entire time.) The mixture may become tough to stir as you're adding water. Resist adding extra water though, as the consistency will become more like oobleck and less like slime. Continue to stir until the entire 1/2 cup of water has been incorporated evenly. If you need to add water add a small drop or two at a time, because the consistency will change quickly.

• Play with your prepared Jell-O Slime on a protected surface or tray, have fun, and ENJOY!

Rock Puzzle

Materials:

- Letter Size Paper (8.5 x 11)
- Rocks of Various Sizes
- Markers

Steps:

- Outline the rocks that you have on a sheet of paper.
- Place the rocks into a container and mix them up.
- Allow your child to match the rock to the rock outline on the paper

Cotton Ball Hockey

Materials:

- Masking Tape
- Cotton balls
- Straws or a Tightly Rolled, Taped Piece of Paper

Steps:

- Use the tape to make a box on a table to serve as the goal.
- Have your child take a cotton ball one at a time and blow it across the floor into the goal.
- Optional: time them and see how many they can get in 3 minutes.

Spaghetti Paintbrushes

Materials:

- Paint
- Paper
- Noodles
- Rubberbands

Steps:

- Rubber band a bunch of noodles together.
- On a paper plate, put out different colors of paint.
- Boil some water, put one end of brush into boiling water.
- After 3-5 minutes, remove from water and use as a paint brush.

Ring Toss

Materials:

- Pencil
 - Paper Towel Tube
 - Paper bowl
 - Scissors
 - 3 Paper Palates

Steps:

- Trace the end of the paper towel tube onto the bottom of the paper bowl.
- Use a scissors to cut out the hole in the bowl.
- Put the tube into the hole to make a stake for the ring toss.
- Cut the center out of your paper plates to make rings.

Breakfast Scramble

Materials:

- Empty Cereal Box
- Scissors

Directions:

- Cut off the front of the cereal box.
- Cut the front of the cereal box into 16 equal squares.
- Have child reassemble the front of the cereal box like a puzzle.

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Toothbrush Painting

Materials:

- Paper
- Tape
- Washable Paints
- Paper Plate(s)
- Old Toothbrushes

Steps:

- Tape a piece of paper to the table.
- Pour paint onto a paper plate.
- Have your toddler dip a toothbrush into the paint.

Tip:

• While creating art, talk about the names of the colors your child uses and even point out what happens when two colors are mixed together.

Block Towers

Materials:

- Whipped or Shaving Cream
- Tray
- Blocks

Steps

- Place a dollop of whipped cream or shaving cream onto a tray.
- Dip a block into the whipped cream or shaving cream to add a thin layer of the cream to the bottom of the block.
- Put the block on the tray continue this process to build tower.

Colorful Pinecone

Materials:

- White Glue
- Large Pinecone
- Tiny Pom-poms
- Ribbon or Yarn (optional)
- Hot Glue Gun (optional)

Steps

- Have your child put small amounts of glue all over the pinecone place small pom-poms on the glue dabs.
- If you want to hang it up, tie a piece of ribbon or yarn and hot-glue it to the bottom of the pinecone.

Drive-In Movie Theater

Materials:

- Cardboard Boxes
- Markers, Crayons, or Colored Pencils
- Movie

Directions:

- Decorate your cardboard box to look like a car.
- Don't forget a steering wheel, wheels, and pillows for your seat
- Turn on your favorite movie and enjoy!

Create A Face

Materials:

- Paper
- Marker
- Plastic Page Protector (optional)
- Play-Doh

Steps

- Discuss the parts of their face: eyes, ears, nose, mouth, eyebrows, hair, etc.
- Draw a large oval on the piece of paper you can place the paper into a plastic page protector (not necessary).
- Help them roll play-doh into balls and shape the play-doh to look like the parts of the face. Discuss where each part goes and then place them onto the paper.

Rock Painting

Materials:

- Paint
- Rock
- Paint Brush
- Water in a Cup
- Paper Towels or a Rag Towel

Steps:

Design a Simple Machine

Materials:

- Blocks
- Cardboard
- Recycling
- Anything and everything!

Directions:

- Choose a simple machine to build
 - Wedge
 - Wheel and axel
 - o Inclined Plane
 - o Screw
 - o Pulley
- Build away!

Color Changing Flowers

Materials:

- 4 Plastic Cups
- 4 Flowers (white carnations work best)
- 4 Colors of Food Coloring
- Water

Steps:

- Take the 4 cups and line them up.
- Fill cup halfway with water.
- Add in about 10-15 drops of food coloring.
- Cut the stems of the flowers and place them into the cups.
- Check on the flowers throughout the day and observe any changes.

Sunflower Paper Plate

Materials:

- Paper Plate
- Paint (tempera or acrylic)
- Bubble Wrap

Green Paper

Steps:

- Place some newspaper down to protect the surface.
- Allow your child to paint the outside rim of the paper plate (the flower.)
- Paint the bubble wrap (black or brown).
- Place the bubble wrap into the center of the flower.
- Let your child cut a stem and leaves and glue to the bottom of the plate

Rock Painting

Materials:

- Rocks
- Paint
- Paper Plate
- Newspaper or Scrap Paper
- Paint brushes
- Water
- Towels

Steps

- Pour paint onto a paper plate.
- Place rocks on newspaper.
- Begin painting a picture on the rock.
 - Ex. flowers, make your rock a cactus, smiley face, or draw the solar system on different rocks

Paper Airplane Competition

Material:

- Paper
- Tape
- Google "Paper Airplane Folding Diagrams" for Ideas

Steps:

- Make paper airplanes.
- Mark off different distance point levels.
- Assign each distance a certain amount of points.
 (Ex. 10, 20, 30, 40, 50)
- Toss, adjust, and toss again.

Mission Impossible

Materials:

- Red Streamers
- Tape

Steps:

• Make a maze from the red streamers that requires a child to bend and step over the streamers to get to the other side. This is perfect game for hallways or smaller playrooms.

Paper Bag Puppets

Materials:

- Brown paper lunch bags
- Markers
- Imagination

Directions:

- Draw faces (animals or people) on your bag.
- The mouth should be located where the bottom of the bag is folded against the side.
- Insert hand into bag.
- Give your very own puppet show!

Fort Building

Materials:

- Couch
- Pillows
- Blankets

Directions:

- Drape pillows over pillows and your couch to create a one of a kind fort.
- Fill your fort with cozy stuffed animals and blankets.
- Perfect for watching movies, reading books, taking naps, or making-believe.

Living Room Picnic

Materials:

- Blanket
- Food

Directions:

- Spread your blanket out in the living room.
- Make your favorite sandwiches and snacks.
- Lay out on blanket and enjoy.

CARD GAMES

War

Materials:

Deck of Cards

Directions

- The object of War is to win all the cards in the deck.
- Aces are high, 2s are low.
- The tricks are played according to rank; suits are ignored.
- All 52 cards are dealt to each player (if you have two players, each player has a total of 26 cards).
- You do not look at your cards they are placed in a stack face-down.
- Holding the stack of cards face-down in one hand, you use the other hand to flip the card face-up on the table in front of you.
- Each player flips a card, so if you have two players you will have two cards facing up in front of you.
- The highest card wins the trick and the trick winner takes the 2 cards and places them at the bottom of his or her stack of facedown cards.
- You continue play like this until one of you has accumulated all the cards.
- In the game of War, a war is a means to break a tie.
- When two cards of the same rank are played, you break the tie by playing new cards in addition to those already on the table.
- The player with the highest-ranking new card wins the tie breaker and all the played cards.
- If you both play a card of the same rank let's say you both play a Jack you have to have a war.
- You leave the Jacks face-up on the table and put one card on top of your Jack face-down and then another card face-up on top of the face-down card.
- So you'll have the following configuration of cards in front of you: the tied Jack, a face-down card, and a face-up card.
- The person with the highest face-up card takes all the cards on the table and places them face-down at the bottom of their stack.
- If the top card is another tie, you place another face-down card, then a face-up card basically, you keep going until someone wins the war.
- This is the best and fastest way to accumulate cards.
- If one of you runs out of cards in the middle of a war, the other player wins.

Spit

Materials:

• Deck of cards

Directions:

- Spit is a game where you need to try and get rid of all your cards as quickly as possible.
- Once you shuffle the cards deal them to each player.
- Each player then deals out five piles of cards in a row in front of himself, with all cards face down.
- The first pile has one card, the second two cards etc until the fifth pile has five cards.
- Turn the top card of each pile face up which is known as stock piles.
- Each player will have eleven cards remaining in his hand which are known as the spit cards.
- When both players are ready, they say "spit" together and each player turns his top spit card face up, placing it in the middle of the table between the two rows of stock piles.
- These two cards are the "spit piles."
- Keep on playing as quickly as the players can, using only one hand and moving one card at a time.
- The goal is to play the 15 cards in your stock piles onto the spit piles.

Snip, Snap, Snorem

Materials:

Deck of cards

Directions:

- Deal the cards out completely (don't worry if some players get more than others). Players sort the cards in their hands by rank: the object of the game is to get rid of all your cards.
- The player to the left of the dealer starts by placing any card down on the table. The next player looks to see if they have a card of the same rank. If they do, they place it down on top of the card, saying "Snip". If they have another card of the same rank, they place it down too, saying "Snap". If they don't, play passes to the next player, and so on. Whoever places the final card of that rank says "Snorem" and wins the right to start the next round with the card of their choice.
